

Stashbusters! -- Materials list

"Rules" of the workshop:

- Bring one quilt (or quilt top) that you have finished that you have leftover fabrics from, including the leftover fabrics - or - one finished quilt to share the leftovers from another project.*
- Add any additional fabrics that go well with the leftovers, from your fabric stash at home.*
- Make sure that you have a fabric that you can use as a background fabric (at least a one yard piece), and one that you can use as a border fabric (at least one and one half yard piece or larger.)*
- We may be sharing fabrics with other workshop attendees, so please come prepared as to whether you will share or you would prefer not to share.*

What makes this workshop so fun is to share the quilts we have made previously, then to see how our new quilts evolve from the previous quilt. And... you're shopping for the class from your Stash!

You will need:

- StashBusters!® pattern which will be a part of your kit* fee. You will have 7 patterns to choose from that each use a different sewing technique. (I will teach all of the techniques during the class)*
- Sewing Machine, power cord and foot pedal, manual - please take the time to clean your machine (under the throat plate), oil if necessary and change the needle prior to class*
- Basic sewing kit***
- Rotary cutter, mat and ruler*
- Table top light (if you require more light)*
- Neutral thread for piecing*
- If you have a digital camera, bring it - and make sure you have batteries and enough room on the card. Or if you don't have a digital camera but you do have a Polaroid, bring it and make sure that you have film. A camera on your cell phone works well too.*
- Don't forget your Fabric!*

** Kit fee: \$10 includes pattern and resources for hand applique not in the materials list. The fee will be collected at the beginning of class.*

***a Basic sewing kit is: scissors for fabric and scissors for paper, ball head pins, seam ripper, machine feet (I recommend a quarter-inch foot with a guidebar), marking pen or pencil, bobbins, machine needles, cloth tape measure, etc.*
